INTRODUCTION



TUDY of American silver leads into many fields of interest and profit. One of them is history in general. Another is history in some of its subdivisions - economic, social, esthetic. Best of all, however, it leads to a better understanding and appreciation of the ethos of America.

Now ethos is a word which I believe ought to appear oftener in our thinking. The dictionary definition of it is "the character, sentiment or disposition of a community or people; the spirit which actuates manners and customs." More concretely, I think, the ethos of America is that characteristic inherent in its mentality, its customs and its handiwork which may be comprehended in the phrase the American Way of Life.

So thoroughly is the American ethos embodied in the works of American silversmiths that it has given to their product a typical identity and it never can be mistaken for that of any other country, though other nations may have influenced design and workmanship. Traces of English ostentation, French flourish and Spanish and Italian rococo fussiness may be found, but all these influences have been transmuted into American forthrightness and simplicity.

The same process is seen in the work of American cabinetmakers. Nobody mistakes a Philadelphia Chippendale chair for its English prototype or a Duncan Phyfe Federal period table for its English Regency model. Even the houses our ancestors built, though patterned after those of Georgian England, were so changed by the American ethos that we consider them typically American.

We learn from the earliest silver made in this country that the American spirit is no phenomenon of recent political origin. It started long before America was a nation.

The seventeenth century silversmiths of New England and New York followed English Jacobean and Restoration and Dutch styles, but altered and simplified their copies so that even the earliest known American silver had an individuality of its own — it signified an American ethos already initiated.

One of the contributing causes of the American spirit expressed by our silversmiths was the ingenuity and native skill demanded of them. In the seventeenth century the master silversmiths of London complained to the Guild Hall that their trade had become too specialized. Too many different craftsmen, they grumbled, must contribute to the making of a single piece — the hammerers, the planishers, the handle molders, the engravers. In America one journeyman silversmith accomplished all the kinds of work done in England by shop specialists.

Study of American silver in connection with certain phases of American history shows that it is a record of the economic and esthetic life of the colonies, all and each. At first, cups, tankards, beakers, porringers and other household utensils were made out of the silver acquired by the owner in trade or commerce. They were his equivalent of a savings bank.

As wealth increased, household silver became an index of the owner's financial status and an indication of his manner of living. Pride of possession led him to have initials or armorial bearings engraved on his silver and these, together with the maker's marks are often an invaluable help to genealogists and other historians.

Study of the variations found in the silver produced in the various colonies is rewarding for the light it throws on local characteristics.

New England silversmiths followed more nearly the designs of England than did the craftsmen of other colonies, perhaps because New England's customs were more like those of Old England than any other colony — except Virginia. There the ties were so close that most of its silver as well as everything else was bought in London. Philadelphia, too, followed English styles (with modifications) but because of Quaker tolerance, design there in every branch of craftsmanship was more or less eclectic.


New York silver is considered to offer the best opportunity for tracing the process of Americanization at work. The city's earliest silversmiths, of course, were Dutch. Then came the English and the French Huguenots. Not one of these alien craftsmen continued the traditions learned in his apprenticeship in Europe. All succeeded in producing something typically American.

When the rococo and chinoiserie fashions flourished in the England of George II, New York silver remained simple, strong, almost stark. When England tired of fussy design toward the end of the eighteenth century and turned to the classics for inspiration, New York silversmiths, and those in the other centers, too, accepted the forms, but made modifications of ornament into a simplicity dictated by the American ethos.

All these suggestions as to the importance of the silversmith, with many others, are to be found in this book, which itself is the most complete study of American silver and its makers yet achieved. Mr. Ensko reckons American silver a manifestation of the American ethos, for he is convinced that it embodies the ingenuity, the spirit and all the other intangible factors that have made America what it is. He believes also that a study of the subject will quicken consciousness to grasp the need for preserving the American ethos, and in this I heartily concur.

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Chapter I

NAMES OF EARLY AMERICAN SILVERSMITHS 1650-1850

HIS LIST of early American silversmiths has been compiled for the convenience of those desiring to know more about the craftsmen who fashioned early American silver. To facilitate reference the names have been listed in alphabetical order. All sources of available information have been used with a considerable amount of critical correction. In keeping with the original intention of this book only silversmiths and allied craftsmen who can be identified with known examples of their workmanship have been included in this list. With the names of silversmiths are earliest working dates; hyphenated double dates indicate births and deaths; and locations of business mentioned are followed by records of marriages, freemanships, apprenticeships, and other pertinent information.

To appreciate and understand the pieces of early American silver illustrated in this chapter it is necessary to know the lines and forms, and the styles of decoration of the various periods represented. This is not difficult if we keep in mind the influence of the early Chinese designs and the evolution into the Grecian shapes. In some instances we find the English and Continental prototypes of slightly later date, especially in the beginning of the eighteenth century, but generally speaking the designs and workmanship are more or less contemporary.

Presenting a simple picture of this development in the eighteenth century we note a globular bowl of 1725 changing into the elongated pear-shape of about 1750, and to the Grecian vase form of 1775. This considerable change in a span of fifty years is also to be found in the square tray conforming to the later fashionable curved outlines; the straight-sided, flat-top tankard acquiring a bulbous body and stepped-domed cover; all reflecting the general tendency to greater height and tapering line. For further study and educative interest the author refers the student to the bibliography included in this book.

Chapter II

MARKS OF EARLY AMERICAN SILVERSMITHS 1650-1850

HE HISTORY of the makers' marks is of broad interest and a matter for special study. A mark essentially is a sign of a merchant or shopkeeper, although its implied significance is to identify an artist-craftsman. Careful attention to the details of a mark is necessary for accurate comparison, identification and attribution.

For easy reference and for clarity of presentation the letters of the initials and names of the silversmiths have been listed alphabetically. These early American makers' marks found on various places of pieces of silver fashioned by these skillful craftsmen are as a rule enclosed in rectangles, ovals, shaped shields, and sometimes in the earlier marks, accompanied in combination with symbols such as a cross, crescent, bird, animal, crown, etc.

This system of marking with the silversmith's stamp is not new. In the Old World the master craftsman, when too distant from the Guild-Hall, used his private mark without the hall-marks of the town, city or country. The silversmith of good reputation was responsible for standard of quality of silver and fine workmanship and the patron accepted the pieces of silver in confidence and appreciation. This practice of marking silver in the New World without controls dates from 1650 until the present day, with only one exception.

Later at the close of the eighteenth century and the early part of the nineteenth century we find additional marks of eagles, eagles' heads, sheaves of wheat, stars, and other stamps with pseudo English hall-marks. There were probably used to distinguish silversmiths' work and possibly to compete with English imported silver. In 1814 the State of Maryland passed a law requiring all silver fashioned in Baltimore to be stamped with three marks, Arms of Baltimore, a date-letter, and the Head of Liberty, in addition to the maker's mark. This law was not too popular and was not enforced after 1830 when the practice was discontinued.

In conjunction with marks of similar makers' initials the identification of a piece of early American silver may sometimes be established by tracing the engraved arms or cyphers of the original owner. Genealogical and historical research is very important in proving conclusively the authenticity of a piece of silver.

Chapter III

LOCATIONS OF SILVERSMITHS' SHOPS

HE LOCATIONS of the shops of the early American silversmiths as indicated on these maps of New York, Philadelphia, and Boston are intended to show as nearly as possible the places where the craftsmen made the many beautiful and valuable examples, still extant, of their workmanship. The writer makes no claim to accuracy in these locations for the reason that, except in very few instances, it is impossible to denote other than an approximate site of the houses and shops because most of the early notices are no more explicit than: "Nigh the New Dutch Church"; "At Burling's Slip"; "In Third Street"; "At the North End," etc., and because even the original early records, from which many of the data have been gathered, have been found to occasionally conflict. These properties have been found chiefly in old deeds, early wills, and newspaper advertisements, and in various publications on the early American silversmiths.

It is difficult to know when the homes and shops were together or apart. It is, however, safe to say that the earliest craftsmen plied their trade in an ell or outbuilding connected with their living quarters and that it is probable that this custom was prevalent through the eighteenth century in many, if not most, cases.

The late 18th century shops, even those with street names and house numbers, except in a few instances, cannot be indicated with any degree of certainty because of inability to identify the numbering of that day with the system in use today. It will, of course, be understood that public places such as the Gaol in Philadelphia were removed prior to the establishment of the shop of certain silversmiths occupying the space as indicated. Those locations with street names and no numbering are difficult to place because of descriptions such as "On the corner of Maiden Lane and Crown." This puts it entirely up to the compiler to decide upon which of the four corners the shop was and in some cases other than corner property, which side of the street. There are some who advertise as "Maiden Lane and

Queen Street" in one year and in the next year the same silversmith advertised on "Lower End of Maiden Lane." These two addresses were probably one and the same. In numerous such instances, it has been assumed that the shop had not been moved. In others, no such liberty has been taken. This is explained for those readers who may question the existing difference in checking with published lists. There are some contemporary craftsmen omitted among the early as well as among the later. This is due to inability to ascertain their property in some cases and to the fact that later they had become too numerous so that only the best known among the later ones were included.

Changes were made in the names of the streets after the maps were printed which explains a difference in the address given in the index with that on the map. For instance: Prior to and subsequently to the Holland map of New York, Pearl Street began at the Battery and extended only to Whitehall Street. From there to Hanover Square, it was called Dock Street. From Hanover Square the continuation of the early Pearl Street was called Queen Street. Later the entire length of the street was given the name of Pearl Street which curves around opening into Broadway above Chambers Street (Frankford Street on the map). Therefore, silversmiths whose addresses were Pearl Street, after the change, are marked on the map on Queen Street. The same changes occur as well on various streets in Philadelphia and Boston. To complicate matters, in addition to the legitimate changes, several of the streets were called by other than their true names: i.e. Beekman Street was commonly called Chapel Street. This was because St. George's Chapel was on Beekman Street. There was a properly named Chapel Street on the west side of Broadway. In locating the shop of a William Smith, whose address was given as Chapel Street, a place was given him on Chapel Street, but later he was removed to Beekman Street when certain facts, stumbled upon accidently, showed his property was actually on Beekman Street. This incident again occurred in the case of Joseph Pinto whose property was found to have been on Bayard Street. The Bayard farm, then quite far from the center of the active settlement, was marked off in streets: Bayard Street, Judith, Elizabeth, etc. Naturally Joseph Pinto was placed on Bayard Street. As he was one of the active craftsmen of his day, it was perplexing that he should have settled so far out in the country. However, since his property was recorded as such, he was allowed to remain there --- a considerable distance from his fellow workers. Later, however, when it was found that Duke Street was commonly called Bayard Street because the estate of the well-known Samuel Bayard, a prominent and prosperous inhabitant and a member of an eminent family of New Amsterdam, was on Duke Street, Joseph Pinto was rescued from his lonely habitation in the distant farm country (not far above where City Hall stands today) and given a place on Duke Street where he rightfully belonged with other craftsmen of his period.

Another well-known silversmith, John Burt Lyng, it appeared, had two addresses, one on Broadway opposite the Lutheran Church, and the other in The Great George Street. Holland's map shows a short street called King George Street and another longer one called George Street. Believing that the longer of the two streets was probably referred to as "The Great George Street" to differentiate between them, John Burt Lyng was placed on George Street. Later, as the research continued, a description of a piece of property was noted thus: "On the corner of Little Queen Street and The Great George Street." The latter, then could have been none other than Broadway so again a removal was made. Again and again these complications arose making necessary quite a number of changes. Kip Street is another which has caused some uncertainty due to a description in an early deed which differs somewhat from Kip Street as marked on Holland's map. It is generally known that Nassau Street was formerly Kip Street.

When reasonable, though not positive, evidence of certain properties has been found, a few of the silversmiths' shops have been marked on the map in more than one place rather than make a definite choice of the two. This occurs but rarely. The earliest and most important of these were Jesse Kip of New York, and Johannes Nys of Philadelphia. Jesse Kip was given a second location — the first on Kip Street, the second on William — because of convincing evidence. Johannes Nys' shop was on Carpenter's Alley in Philadelphia. Two locations are given him on the map both taken from reliable sources — one giving Carpenter's Alley near the corner of Fourth Street between Chestnut and Walnut — the other giving it on the east side of Front above Walnut — so Johannes Nys will be found in both places.

Garret Oncklebag owned several large tracts of land. These are not all indicated on the map because some of them were in outlying districts. The Jacob Boelen property on Queen Street above Burling Slip is questionable. Certain research material revealed such strong facts pointing in that direction as to seem justifiable to place him there. His Broadway property is one of the few very early sites so clearly described in deeds that it has been possible to mark this one of his shops on the map with assurance.

On the other hand, with no assurance, the Cowells of Boston are given their location in the South End of Boston. The research material at hand failed in description of the Cowell property more detailed than "the South End of Boston." Not knowing just where the "South End of Boston" began nor just how much of the city was considered the "South End," and also not wanting to omit such early and well-known, as well as expert craftsmen, as the Cowell family of silversmiths, a spot was selected near some of the other silversmiths of their period and

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there they will be found on the map although they may be some distance from their true location.

Vast research and close study of all material gathered has been required to establish as accurate locations as possible before making final indication on these maps. It is hoped that the readers will make generous allowances for the decision in the choice as shown.

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

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
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Paul Revere House in North Square, Boston 1770

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E. E. Bailey

"In 1836 Ebenezer E. Bailey bought a small piece of land at the junction of Sullivan and Main Street, etc. For several years previous Mr. Bailey had been engaged in manufacturing silver spoons and spectacles, at West Unity (New Hampshire) ---He took his brother Samuel C. into partnership, and they carried on the silversmith and Jewelry business quite extensively, under the firm name of E E & S C Bailey, for twenty-five years, when the business of manufacturing was practically given up. -- "
